3rd Thursday: Our Place in the Web of Life program


4th Thursday: ECO-LAB featuring guest speakers, worshops, and teach-ins about how we can make more sustainable choices in our daily lives!

ENDOWMENT TRUST

The UUCA Endowment Trust was established to enhance the long-term financial security of the Church so that it may succeed in its mission. Growing the Endowment Trust is an investment in the future of the UUCA.





Endowment Trustees meet with Michael Angelucci of Level Financial Advisors to review the status of your funds. Approximately \$935,000 is invested using a strategy of 50% Fixed Income/50% Equity. About \$25,000 is restricted to music due to a bequest. Annually, we earn about \$24,000 in dividends and interest. Our overall growth for the year was 8.28%.

The earnings from dividends and interest are tapped for unanticipated projects/capital expenditures that fall outside the operating budget when requested by the Board of Trustees. Because the Endowment Trust is a separate entity, the Trustees have specific fiduciary responsibilities to maintain. These are fully explained in the bylaws.

Your Endowment Trustees are: Marie Evans, Jerry Kent, Lauraine Marcus, Joe Rautenstrauch, Elaine Cusker; Board Liaison: Don Tucker.

A NOVEMBER SPIRITUAL PRACTICE FROM SOUL MATTERS

In her poem *Gratitude*, Mary Oliver asks herself and then answers eight questions of attention:

What did you notice?
What did you hear?
When did you admire?
What astonished you?
What would you like to see again?
What was most tender?
What was most wonderful?
What did you think was happening?



It's a poem that treats the details of our days as a blessing and calls us to do the same. So for this month's exercise, let's accept her invitation:

First, take a few days and just spend some time with the poem.

Then use Oliver's questions to **write a version of your own** by giving your own answers to her eight questions. Here's an elegant example of someone making it their own: http://walkingintheholypresence.blogspot.com/2017/04/poem-gratitude-by-mary-oliver.html

But here's the catch: You've got to decide how to gather the details for your poem. When reading Oliver's poem, you get the feeling she wrote it at the end of a long day outdoors. But it could just as easily have been written at the end of a week, a year, or even a life. So you pick what calls to you. Maybe you take a two-hour hike and then sit down and write it. Or maybe sit down and write it at the end of an ordinary day of work and family. You might even want to answer the questions as if they are asking about the past year of your life. Or the past few decades. The point is to let Oliver's eight questions help you remember that our attention is a way, maybe the best way, we say thanks for these precious days we've been given.

FAITH DEVELOPMENT



BOARD NOTES

Dear UUCA members and friends,

If you're the type of person who reads the Board Notes in *The Forward,* then you're probably also the type of person who would have attended one of the facilities information sessions led by Don and Dian Tucker over the past two weeks. Some have commented at or after the session that the information they heard had left them saddened, but some perspective should be kept when thinking about this, because it left me feeling optimistic.



Naturally, a presentation that has the aim of informing the congregation about problems with facilities will, well, have a lot of focus on the problems with the facilities. A couple positives were included (the chapel is in great shape!) with all the negatives, but the aim wasn't to congratulate ourselves on the good features of our facilities and grounds. The fact that the negatives aren't obvious to most of us says a lot about our facility, however we want a higher bar than that, and action is needed or else the problems will become a lot more conspicuous.

My optimism comes from the attitudes and ideas I've heard so far from the congregation. The problems are manageable, but to address them we need to understand them better, which means gathering data from people who understand buildings professionally. So we'll be consulting with architects to commission a study, with the outcome being a prioritized list of problems we have with the facilities, an estimate of what it will cost to repair each, and importantly, what each would cost down the line if we were to ignore it now. Input from the congregation seems to be supportive of this step.

Once we have this information, we need to decide what to do, and how to make it happen. This means making choices, perhaps hard choices, and deciding how to fund the actions that are chosen. A very broad range of actions have been mentioned, yet perhaps the thinking is not broad enough. When you compare, say, keeping the house versus simply not having it, it becomes hard to support removing it. But instead consider what could be put in its place, and here we need more imagination. We should think about what our needs are, and envision how we can meet them with the opportunity the facilities issue provides. Only with this more complete picture can we as a congregation make a decision. Hopefully it will be one that seems easy and obvious at the time.

You may have noticed a small change in the lobby — a new water fountain! This to me is a microcosm of our larger facilities issue. The old water fountain had failed, something needed to be done. As a consequence, we have a new one, with the more modern feature of being also a bottle-filling station. This meshes with our UUCA values for sustainability, it's a welcome upgrade for our child-care tenants, perhaps appeals to youth, and it's just better. A (tiny) crisis in a piece of our facilities led us to a demonstrable improvement. Let's hope this reflects what we can do for the church on a larger scale.

This is a brief list of what the Caring Group would try to provide:


- Transportation to Sunday service or other church activities
