#### **MINISTER'S CORNER**

**New Year – New Opportunity to put FAITH IN ACTION** 2017 brings some innovations to the Faith Development program for children and youth – like the 3 week January Intercession program *Black People Matter*. Each Sunday – January 8, 15 and 22 – children and youth

in the Spirit Play, Junior and Senior Youth will begin in the service as usual and then proceed upstairs to the Channing Chapel (Spirit Play room). After an opening and introduction to the theme of the day, participants can then select from a variety of activities/discussions/projects geared to differing interests and ages. While participants will benefit the most from attending all 3 sessions, they are freestanding so come when you can.

**January 8- WHAT?** What is this thing we call color? Are we really black or white? Participants will come away with a broader concept of who they are and explore what is beautiful/ attractive.

**January 15 – SO WHAT?** So what does it take to be a hero or heroine? On this Martin Luther King Jr. weekend we will learn about real living people, some from our neighborhood or church, who are telling the real story about racial disparities in our community. So what clues can we uncover to learn the real story?

**January 22 – NOW WHAT?** A popular slogan among Unitarian Universalists is "Deeds, not creeds". But what is the underlying value that informs my action? And getting skilled at any deed requires practice, so we will practice the skills needed to be a brave ally or friend.

**Spirit Play** (K-5<sup>th</sup>/6<sup>th</sup>) and **Junior Youth** (6<sup>th</sup>-8<sup>th</sup>) teaching teams are looking for a few good people (male, female, gay, straight, parents, childless, experienced or first time volunteer) to share part of your Sunday mornings with our fabulous kids! **Spirit Play team** travels to the *UU Church of Buffalo January 8* to observe their Spirit Play classes, and then meets *Saturday afternoon, January 21* to plan for winter and spring sessions. **Junior and Senior Youth teams** have not yet finalized a date for their January planning meetings.

#### **Our Whole Lives News**

**4<sup>th</sup>-5<sup>th</sup> Grade level** is being offered at the UU Church of Buffalo this Jan/Feb/Mar from 10:30-noon on Sundays. Parent orientation is January 8th at 10:30, and then the class runs for the following 8 weeks. There is a \$30 charge. UUCA families are welcome to participate – contact Sarah Martin, UUCB Director of Religious Education (<u>sarahmartin@buffalouu.org</u>) for more details or to enroll.

**High School (10<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> grade) level**. On Sunday, Dec. 18th we had a unique UU experience –

One comment was that such a performance would likely be perceived as irreverent in many churches but with UU's we can learn the important messages by playing with the children and all having fun – that is so wonderful. The effort to discover our *UUCA Vision and Mission* is continuing, the 'scribes' are working to smooth out the product of the September 17 workshop. #### A Sacred Trust



The Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Amherst takes seriously it's responsibility to protect children and youth from sexual abuse and volunteers from false accusations. The Board of Trustees therefore has established policies and the Faith Development Committee procedures to minimize the possibility of harm. Newcomers are invited to at least 6 months of "getting to know us" before volunteering to be a Faith Development teacher. Teaching teams gather occasionally and

communicate regularly with the Interim Director of Faith Development, and organize their schedules so that 2 adults are present at every session. All OWL facilitators, Faith Development teachers and staff are required to submit an application form agreeing to a Background Check and checking of references. If you have comments or questions about UUCA's Safe Congregation Policy please speak to Karen LoBracco, Interim Director of Faith Development or a member of the Board of Trustees.

Update for VOICE- Buffalo for 2016 ~ from Pat Burke for the Social Justice Committee



CRIMINAL JUSTICE- Establish Diversion Programs as a means to address mental health in under resourced communities as a path forward to reducing the number of those incarcerated. VOICE will continue to hold elected officials and stakeholders accountable through our collective and strategic partnerships.

WORKFORCE DIVERSITY & DEVELOPMENT TASKFORCE-This past year, VOICE has developed partnerships with Catholic Charities, Back to Basics, PUSH and Buffalo Niagara Partnership. In 2007 we hope to develop specific objectives and goals.

DISABILITY & ACCESSIBILITY TASKFORCE- This group is led by people with disabilities who want to develop a satellite office for The Developmental Disability Regional Office (DDRO) in Buffalo , since the other office is in West Seneca and is impossible to reach via public transportation.

REFUGEE & IMMIGRANT LEADERSHIP TEAM TASKFORCE-After a successful public meeting Oct 25, this taskforce will be gathering to discuss and ensure that Lafayette can become a nationally recognized international School.

#### Faith Community Nurse Column Eveline Hartz, RN BSN FCN

Happy, Joyful and prosperous New Year to all!

This past year a great deal of thought has been given to black lives matter and inclusivity. UU folk pride themselves on inclusivity. My question: why isn't UUCA completely accessible? While most of the downstairs is accessible, I dread to think how a wheel chair (w/c) user would maneuver into the bathroom stalls. Or even how the vast majority of churchgoers would make it up/down the stairs.

UUCA isn't unique in this. There is evidence of discrimination in every part of life. Here are some examples:

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Tom can walk short distances but is unable to do long distances. He asks his doctor about a wheelchair. the MD says no, keep walking. Tom is now homebound (and out of sight). Sharon, an electric w/c user, is denied membership into a senior center. When she calls social services for advice they reply " Senior centers don't want the image of members in wheelchairs."

June, received a prescription from her MD and has purchased a wheelchair. It's not working well for her. The sales person replies, after looking at the chair, "nothing can be done about this". In fact there is a solution - but it's not a standard, in the book solution. The chair is useless to June. She is homebound and out of sight.

Jim is fine in home, but needs wheels for outdoors to go places. Medicare says no deal, they only approve chairs for in-home use.

- Mary has had an electric chair many years and lived independently. She now is looking at assisted living. She finds the dining tables are so close together there is no way a wheelchair would fit and the doors are so heavy she can't open them from a chair.
- Cost is prohibitive if you are paying out of pocket. \$5-10,000 for a standard electric chair, \$35,000+ for specialized chairs., Then there is the wheelchair accessible van \$65,000+
- Jane (who is unable to stand) & friend go to Chautauqua institute. One of the religious houses has a brand new accessible bathroom. Jane goes to use it and finds that the door won't close while the wheelchair is inside. She would have to transfer onto the toilet in full view of the public, a second person would need to move the chair out to close the door. When this is mentioned to the manager, the manager haughtily (rather nastily) replies they followed all the rules. Luckily the Presbyterian house had a truly accessible bathroom - the only one on the premises at the time.
- John is a wheelchair user and requires an accessible home. He is currently on Medicaid, he has just earned his PhD but finds he is, on his projected income, unable to pay for the medical care, chair & van he requires. He stays out of the workforce.

Why this mindset that lets us, as a society, accept this? If our fist is unable to pound in a nail do we call ourselves disabled and forget it? Or do we use a hammer and pound it in? If we can't get across the street with use of our feet, isn't the wheelchair or any other device just a tool to help us get there? Why stay home to avoid a stigma? Is a person disabled or <u>enabled</u> by using whatever is needed to get to where he/she wants to go?

While many of us are more than willing to help, what we could be doing is making our spaces & transportation accessible and user friendly to all. That would be one awesome New Year's resolution.



#### U.U.-U.N. NEWS

The main purpose of the United Nations is to eliminate the scourge of war and promote world peace. At the present time, the U.N. can achieve its main purpose only to a limited extent. That is because the human family has not

committed itself to universal and complete disarmament under U.N. auspices and the U.N. does not possess an effective system of collective security to keep the peace.

The U.N. does, however, attempt to promote peaceful political solutions to various conflicts. The U.N. employs the political tools of peacekeeping and diplomacy to help all 193 U.N. Member States prevent and resolve all conflicts peacefully and to avert the suffering and destruction of war. In pursuit of these objectives, U.N. peacekeepers, peacemakers and envoys are dispatched to areas of tension around the world to assist in defusing crises and brokering negotiated peace settlements in our interdependent world's various conflicts. Civilian-led "political missions" are also deployed throughout our interdependent world with mandates to encourage dialogue and cooperation among all 193 U.N. Member States.

The work of the United Nations to foster credible democratic elections around the world also contributes directly to efforts to promote peace and prevent conflicts. Underlying the work of the U.N. in all these areas is the belief that political, economic, social and cultural issues are at the root of most conflicts, and thus political solutions are required to resolve them. Rational dialogue and compromise are a better alternative than unnecessary violence, destruction, and death.

United Nations peacekeeping, peacemaking and preventive diplomacy have made major contribution to reduction in armed conflicts globally in recent decades. Despite these successes, far too many people live under the shadow of war in our interdependent world. Efforts are ongoing, therefore, to increase the effectiveness of the U.N. in fulfilling and realizing the U.N. Charter. In a word, this means strengthening the Department of Political Affairs (DPA) and the Department of Peacekeeping Operations (DPKO), the main means of U.N. peacekeeping, peacemaking and preventive diplomacy.

With the support of all 193 U.N. Member States, the DPA and DPKO are evolving into more agile instruments of crisis resolution. Nevertheless, world peace will remain elusive until the U.N. possess its own effective system of collective security. Unfortunately, this goal has eluded the United Nations since its creation on 24October 1945 and at the present moment in human history, no rational person or organization can predict when this goal will be realized. This is a sad state of affairs, but it is unfortunately, the truth.

Here is a basic fact that everyone should keep in mind. U.N. Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon will retire on 31December 2016. He comes from South Korea. He will be replaced on 1January 2017 by Antonio Guterres, the U.N's new Secretary-General. He comes from Portugal. We should all wish him good luck. He will need it given the current state of international affairs. ~David Slive, U.N. Envoy
