Thanks for all your support and encouragement in December, as I approached my interview with the Ministerial Fellowship Committee in Boston-- a rite of passage for anyone seeking to enter professional UU ministry. I'm happy to report that I passed, and have been welcomed into Preliminary Fellowship with the Unitarian Universalist Association. This is a huge milestone, as well as a great relief!

What's in store for 2020? Well, I'll be finishing up my time in seminary, and completing my final semester here at UUCA. We'll be finishing up the EJ (Environmental Justice) programming we began in October. We'll be reading and discussing *An Indigenous Peoples' History of the United States*, the UU Common Read for 2020. And we'll be thinking and talking about how this congregation wants to move forward with its Environmental Justice ministry.

I'm seeking to organize a group from UUCA to attend the Citizens' Climate Lobby northeast regional conference in Troy, New York, from March 6-8. The conference includes training on EJ political issues on a national level, as well as how to build bridges to other local groups in the fight for a healthy environment. The fees for attending are quite reasonable (early-bird pricing is \$95 for the three-day training, and students are \$25). We can carpool and also explore home hospitality options. I hope you'll consider joining us!

Rev. James E. Giles Biography

The Rev. James E. Giles is President of VOICE Buffalo – an organization that organizes for social and economic justice, and the Administrator for the Stop The Violence Coalition. He has been a strong force in the Restorative Justice movement and Prisoner Reentry for Erie County.

He sits on the Board of Directors for Catholic Charities, Child and Adolescent Treatment Services (CATS), City of Buffalo EMS Board and Youth Visionaries. He has received many awards for outstanding service to the community. He founded and developed Back To Basics Outreach Ministries, Inc. – a leader in Restorative Justice, Prisoner Re-entry, transitional housing, youth development and spiritual enrichment, as well as Gang and Anti Violence Initiatives.

His certifications from area colleges include Psychology (Niagara Community); Sociology/African American History (Buffalo State); and NYS Substance Abuse Counseling (Medaille). He is the Pastor of Greater Works Deliverance Fellowship which is part of the Dunamis Covenant Fellowship of Churches.

Pastor Giles has been a peacemaker and community leader in Buffalo for almost 40 years. His current work includes leading the Buffalo Peacemakers, an exciting new collaboration between six antiviolence groups – Back to Basics, Buffalo United Front, FATHERS, MADDADS, No More Tears, and Stop The Violence Coalition. The Buffalo Peacemakers Violence and Gang Intervention Program – proactive intervention into the cycle of violence in the lives of gang-involved or at-risk youth. In addition, he is also the Director of the SNUG program, a more intense Violence Interruption initiative.

BOARD NOTES

Dear UUCA members and friends,

With the holidays and the New Year upon us, I'm reminded that I'm almost halfway through my term as Board Chair. It is sometimes frightening to realize how quickly time seems to pass! The Board set itself three goals for the year, and this is an opportune moment to review our progress. Here we go...



1. Arrive at a consensus regarding the future of the physical church.

2. We have conducted information sessions to inform the congregation about the issues with the buildings and grounds. While the facts are worrisome, feedback suggests that the membership is glad that we recognize the problem and are attempting to confront it.

3. We have formed a task force of about 10 people to move the renovation process forward. Others are welcome to join if interested.

4. We have received quotes from two architectural firms to perform a study of the facilities, to identify necessary repairs/renovations and estimate their costs. This may further include a visioning study to identify and rough-cost a building project.

5. In the near future, we aim to have informal small-group meetings with the congregation after services in January, to sketch out a long-term vision for the UUCA that will inform our development.

6. Bring to completion the marketing and welcoming goals laid out in the strategic plan.

7. We've made some changes to the foyer with the aim of making it more welcoming and informative to newcomers. This is still a work in progress.

8. We are assembling a task force to study and generate options for moving and replacing the church sign that sits near Main St. If you are interested in participating in the task force, send me an email or talk to one of the Trustees to let us know that you would like to be considered. We want a small but diverse group for this task, so consider what knowledge or skills you can bring to the effort.

9. The Marketing Task Force has started discussions (currently among themselves) about the church identity, name, brand, tag line, and other matters needed to give us a strong and recognizable identity. Anyone interested in getting involved is welcome.

10. Implement policy-based governance.

11. The Board has completed an initial draft of a policy manual, and I want to acknowledge Scott Harrigan for doing much of the detail work needed to bring this forward.

12. We have staffed our governance committees (Personnel, led by Randy Kent; Finance, led by John Thompson; Mission, led by Suzanne Christ; Nominating & Leadership Development, led by Marie Evans), and they have been very busy developing policies and procedures within their respective realms. The Ministry Teams have also been active.

13. Given how I consistently underestimate the rate of time's passage (in other words, how long it takes to get things done), it is hard to say how far we'll get with all of these goals by July, but I'm glad we're making some progress. This happens because of the efforts of some key people who are investing mightily their time and talent toward these goals.

Over Thanksgiving I traveled to Pittsburgh to see family, and took the opportunity to visit the Sunnyhill UU church. They have followed a path similar to the one we're embarking on, and it was very heartening to see how far they've come. They renovated their church (which included an old house) and have a beautiful and very functional facility now. They accomplished this in part due to a surprisingly successful capital campaign, and subsequently they increased their membership threefold (to about 300). It can happen.

I wish you all a holiday that is the best it can be.

SOCIAL JUSTICE

UUCA can be proud of the support they have given to Preventionfocus led by Cheryl Stevens. Social Justice did a plate collection on September 29th. Through the generosity of our members we were able to fund one of the 10-week programs of the Supper Club.

The Supper Club, through Preventionfocus, educates experientially how to shop, manage a budget, and prepare nutritious meals made from scratch. They learn to present and serve food as well as how to set a formal table. The girls learn to work together and develop conflict resolution skills.

Part of the program includes introspection through journaling. Not only do they reflect on the food preparation; they also use this as an avenue to reflect on their relationships at home, school and the program.

At the last dinner, the girls were allowed to invite a woman who was a powerful role model in their lives. The Lackawanna Middle School Principal and her daughter as well as the school counselor were in attendance and they have been with the program every step of the way. They expressed their enthusiasm for the program and their gratitude for our church in creating this opportunity for the girls.

Before dining, each girl and the guests were asked to say one thing they were thankful for. It was a beautiful and heartfelt sharing.

John and Karen Thompson, Margot Shoemaker, Pat Burke, Faith Pham and Christine Boczarska were invited to the final program celebration. The menu and the food was wonderful. It began with spinach artichoke dip cups, followed by a salad with a delicious vinaigrette dressing. Baked chicken, mashed potatoes and roasted asparagus rounded out the meal. Dessert was red velvet cheesecake brownies.

After dinner, the girls were given awards for their participation in the program. They also received a recipe book to celebrate their completion of the program. They were very grateful for the opportunity and sad to see it end. The principal was so inspired that she is seeking other financial avenues to create more of these opportunities in her school for both the girls and the boys.

26 November 2019 2019 Human Rights Day Message

10 December is Human Rights Day; that is because the United Nations' Universal Declaration of Human Rights was adopted by the United Nations General Assembly on 10 December 19498 in Paris, France. U.N. Headquarters in New York City was not finished until 1952. The Commission on Human Rights began its work in January 1947 under the chairpersonship of Eleanor Roosevelt (1884-1962). In thirty Articles, the Declaration sets forth basic human rights and fundamental freedoms, to which all human beings are entitled to everywhere in the world without any discrimination. 2019 is the seventy-first anniversary of the Universal Declaration's adoption.



The United Nations' General Assembly had proclaimed the U.N.'s Universal Declaration of Human Rights as a "common standard of

achievement for all peoples and nations." No U.N. Member State has a perfect human rights record, but all 193 U.N. Member States should aspire to realize the Universal Declaration's thirty Articles.

The U.N. has also adopted two Covenants to formally implement the U.N.'s Universal Declaration of Human Rights: the Covenant on Civil and Political Rights and the Covenant on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights. No U.N. Member State has currently formally adopted and implemented both of these Covenants. That remains to be achieved in the future, but it is imperative that the adoption and implementation of both these two Covenants by all 193 U.N. Member States occur as quickly as possible.

Both the United Nations' Charter and Universal Declaration of Human Rights categorically state that the realization of human rights is essential for the promotion and maintenance of world peace. Therefore, on Human Rights Day (10 December), every U.N. Member State and person should resolve to implement the Universal Declaration's thirty Articles. This will begin the process of leading our troubled, interdependent world in a much more constructive direction. In too many parts of the world, there are flagrant human rights violations and these must be eliminated if world peace is to prevail in the future.

Implementing the U.N.'s Universal Declaration of Human Rights throughout our interdependent world may be a daunting task, but it is not an insurmountable one and should evoke humanity's foremost efforts. At the present moment in human history, there is nothing more important than the human family, achieving and maintaining world peace. The United Nations' Universal Declaration of Human Rights and its thirty Articles should, therefore, be read by all people and implemented throughout our interdependent world in order to promote world peace and human betterment. The international clock of doom is ticking. There is no time to lose if the human family is to flourish and not be rendered extinct.

We saw a greatly increased need from Thanksgiving to New Year's and our shelves need restocking of the basics: cereal, tuna, canned fruit and fruit cups, canned or boxed soup, juice/milk drink boxes, pasta (including lasagna), pasta sauce, toilet paper and deodorant. Also items for celebrating like canned hams (non-perishable), stuffing mixes, side dishes, canned yams, cake mixes and ground coffee. Please no corn and no green beans. Remember nonperishables only and no glass.

We are open 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, with no questions asked. You don't have to wait to get help. All are welcome.


