Time for a Change - or 2 to be exact!



Butterflies – a Sign of Radical Change



It all started in April when the Faith Development Committee selected *Metamorphosis* as the theme of Faith Development Sunday, reflecting the profound changes taking place in programming for children and youth. On May 20, Flower Communion Sunday, the children and youth stepped out of the service for a brief time and welcomed ~ 35 tiny (1/4 inch long) larva of Painted Lady Butterflies. Small cups were prepared with special food and VERY gently the larva transferred.



Here they grew in the Atrium, watched over by UUCA staff and members as well as staff and children from Main Street Daycare. After doubling and tripling in size they formed a chrysalis, attaching to the filter paper on the top of the plastic containers.



On June 5 Rev. Michelle and Interim Director of Faith Development Karen LoBracco tackled the delicate task of transferring filter paper with attached chrysalis from cup to butterfly net. Eventually 28 pieces of paper were taped inside and the net hung in the Atrium..





On Thursday, June 7, sometime between 2-3pm, the first butterfly emerged! By the Faith Development Sunday June 10 about 20 butterflies were fluttering around the net, evoking 'Ooohs' and 'Aaahs' from young and old alike.





After the Annual Meeting those that were ready were encouraged to leave for the surrounding gardens. The following Tuesday the Board of Trustee released the final 7 Painted Ladies before taking up other work of the congregation.

Three Ways to Include UUCA Endowment in your Will

A gift through your will or trust is an ideal way to make UUCA a part of your legacy.

You can make:

A Gift of "What's Left." If you do not wish to specify the exact size of your charitable gift (often the size of a future estate is difficult to estimate), you might consider naming UUCA Endowment as a residual

beneficiary of your estate. You may provide that all, a specific amount or a percentage of the remainder of your estate pass to UUCA Endowment after other specific bequests have been fulfilled.

A Specific Gift. A gift of a fixed dollar amount or specific property is the simplest. Securities, real estate and other personal property can all be given through a will.

A Memorial Gift. To honor a loved one, you can designate a gift of a specific amount, specific asset, percentage or remainder of your estate be given in their memory.

BOARD NOTES

Dear fellow members and friends,

It is an honor to find myself in the position of chairing our Board of Trustees (BOT) for the 2018-2019 church year. Compared to a lot of our congregants here at UUCA, I am a relatively new member, joining the community officially in April of 2011. Since then my donation of time and talents have been mainly with the grounds committee and in Faith Development (FD). I served as liaison to both Facilities council and the FD committee my first year on the board, and liaison to Ministry Council and FD my second year. The Search Team for hiring a new FD director was formed by the FD committee and BOT last year, and with the

cooperation of many facets of our congregation, that search was a success. We will gratefully and enthusiastically welcome Zoe Bell - Schwede next month.

In the process of changing here at church, as well as through our lives, we discern what is serving us and what is no longer serving us. This is ultimately how we grow. In our immediate future, our church leadership will continue to make efforts to align with our Mission. Borrowing from our Immediate Past Board Chair, Hella Jacob's final column last month, our goals will continue to be:

- 1.) Work on church identity and purpose through discerning mission and vision and develop a strategic plan to guide us.
- 2.) Work on building trust throughout the system and among individuals.
- 3.) Reframe the governance structure through modification to the council system

Our community will grow and be healthy through these changes with the participation of individuals like you and me. We get back what we put in. Pay attention to our growing and changing community through your own participation in it. That can be as simple as attending an event or signing up to welcome others on Sunday morning, or more involved like joining a committee or chairing an upcoming event. When we are engaged, we are healthy, as individuals, and as community.

While I was gardening at church last month, I finished weeding and planting the main entrance and was working on the front, running short on time, and had just discovered the water in front had not been turned on. I didn't want to bother our caretaker Chris, and was thinking about the easiest way to bring water to get the job done. It was not something I could let go until a "next time."

A mom from a group who was meeting in the Living Room happened to come out right then with her 9 year old son. She asked if he could play on the playground. I honestly didn't know the proper answer, so I mumbled in frustration with that fact (I am supposed to know this, right, as BOT chair?) and also the lack of water, and then I said, "Well, he could be my water fetcher if he wants." And he was willing and able.

We went to the truck to get my large watering can. He followed me to the kitchen where we filled it up along with two other pitchers. We carried the water all the way through the building to the front, and as I dug the holes for each small zinnia and placed it, he filled up their spots with water. By the time I was done digging he was almost done filling, and I went back and covered them up. Together we watered them in, with just enough and not a drop to spare. It was magical. Then I told him to go play on the playground, just not to hurt himself.

Community building happens in small ways. Let us treasure and build this beloved community together.

Strategic Planning



"What to do with our building? How to handle the land? What about declining membership? Will the budget ever be in the green again?"

When the congregation decided to engage in strategic planning, I believe that some large, looming questions were in mind.

As an organizational development consultant, my job is to help assess the problem and recommend some strategic solutions.

When you visit the doctor for frequent headaches, the diagnosis could be anything from sinus trouble, hypertension or myopia, to a brain tumor. When I began my inquiry, the severity of the diagnosis or the intensity of the treatment required was yet unknown. The swirling questions were obvious; the course forward was not.

Over the past few weeks, I've been crafting some recommendations that may surprise you. You may have expected a treatment that included immediate drastic building plans or staffing changes. But our organizational health is not affected by the organizational equivalent of a heart attack or advanced cancer. Instead, I've found that we're affected by something more like scurvy or rickets: dramatic symptoms resulting from a lack of organizational nutrition.

The fact is, many of our most dramatic problems have become dramatic because we failed to diagnose something simple for quite some time. The world changed and UUCA, like many, many churches, didn't shift how it communicated or developed its programs. In some key areas, particularly marketing and wayfinding, our church has failed to build a pipeline for unchurched new comers. Our neighbors ceased to feel pressure to take their kids to Sunday school; they no longer felt the urge to attend for themselves. We failed to speak our value and offer invitation, and lost members to death and organizational change.

What does this mean? As I mentioned last month, our pipeline (or funnel) is broken. We need to repair it. The church can't continue into the 2020s unless we address our community as it is and speak the value of our community into it. Without this infusion of resources and fresh perspective, we will continue with over tapped resources: exhausted volunteers and empty coffers. But more importantly, in this political and social environment, how dare we do less than invite our whole community into a safe space for growth?



The symptoms are obvious, the diagnosis is not bleak. But we need to start reaching for the Vitamin C. I'm in, if you're in.

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UUCA GET COOKIN'!

An easy recipe for warm weather.

PASTA WITH FRESH MUSHROOMS (Serves 2-4)

1 lb. fresh mushrooms, sliced, any variety or mixed.

(We used oyster mushrooms from the N. Tonawanda farmers' market - very tender.)

1 medium yellow onion, chopped

1 lb. linguine

4 Tbsp Butter

4 Tbsp Olive oil

Salt and pepper

Parmesan cheese, grated

In a large pan sauté the chopped onion in 2 tablespoons of butter and 2 tablespoons of olive oil until soft. Set aside. In the same pan sauté the sliced mushrooms in 2 tablespoons of butter and 2 tablespoons of olive oil. When almost done add the onion and continue cooking until the mushrooms are soft and lightly browned. Add salt and pepper to taste and keep warm.

Cook the pasta according to the directions on the package. Drain and place in a large bowl, adding the cooked mushrooms and mix in. Serve with grated Parmesan cheese.

Simple but very tasty. Serve with soup, a salad or your choice of vegetables.

Making it Vegan, Vegetarian, Gluten- and/or Dairy Free. (Eveline Hartz)

In place of the butter use your favorite oil or butter substitute. Serve with Parmesan cheese on the side in order for your quests to choose whether to add the cheese or not.

FYI - the Hartz's recently joined Rusty bucket mushrooms (https://www.rustybucketmushrooms.com) through our CSA - Community supported agriculture - Farm (http://www.therootdownfarm.com). These are locally grown mushrooms, harvested and delivered weekly. Delicious! Check them out if you enjoy fresh mushrooms.



NEEDED: RESPITE VOLUNTEERS (just 4 hours per month)

RESPITE is a <u>social program</u> for individuals with mild to moderate dementia. The program provides active engagement, companionship and a meal or snack while providing respite for their caregiver. It will be open to members of UUCA and the community. RESPITE is offered once per month on a set date and time to be determined.

The Caring Committee has been visiting RESPITE programs and we are very impressed. We hope to start a program at UUCA this summer.

ADDICTION 2018

In 2018 addiction to drugs and/or alcohol continues to grow - devastating for the individual and all those to whom s/he is connected. The horrific consequences of addiction ripple throughout the community. While there are programs available such as Evergreen Rehab (https://www.evergreendrugrehab.com) and Erie County Prevention Focus (https://www.evergreendrugrehab.com) are the second to the

preventionfocus.org) many people are unable to access the help they need, when they need it and are ready to accept it. Family members are as hopeless and devastated in their efforts to heal and protect their addicted loved one as the addict him/herself. The greatest fear of a parent materializes when their addicted (youth or adult) child's cycles of relapse, hopelessness, feelings of self-worthlessness become so overwhelming the only solution in the child's mind is death - by overdose or gun.

The poem below is written by the partner of a mother whose son, struggling with addiction, committed suicide at the age of 28.

It's Me
Hey, you guys, don't feel guilty,
It was just my time to go.
I can see you're all feeling sad,
I can see the tears still flow.

My life's journey ended early, The path I chose was short. You all tried your best to change it, But in the end it was for me to sort.

I know I caused you sadness, I know I caused you pain, But I was captured by these demons, They wouldn't set me free again.

They took away my freedom, They took away my choice, And when they got their hooks in, You could hear it in my voice.

There were times I tried to fight them, There was a time I nearly won, But they came back and overpowered me, I had nowhere left to run.


I haven't really left you guys, I am closer than you know, I will be the whisper in the wind, I will be everywhere you go.

One day you will all forgive me One day you will understand And when your time on earth is done I will be waiting to take your hand.



U.U.-U.N. NEWS

"The Rule of International Law and the U.N.'s Agenda 2030"

There is an excellent article in a previous issue of the <u>U.N. Chronicle</u>. It is entitled. "The Role Of The U.N. In Promoting The

Rule of International Law," written by Jan Eliasson, former Deputy Secretary-General of the U.N. The rule of international law is the foundation of the United Nations. On the international level, it is fundamental to international peace and security. All 193 U.N. Member States have an obligation to abide by the U.N. Charter and the wider body of international law. All 193 U.N. Member States are expected to abide by these laws and work to ensure that seeking world peace is the essence of the U.N.'s work to promote the rule of law at the international level.

On 24 September 2012, the U.N. General Assembly adopted a Declaration emphasizing the importance of the rule of international law. The U.N. provides rule of international law assistance to over 150 U.N. Member States. The U.N. has also developed a large body of universally agreed upon norms and standards. This Declaration builds upon the fundamental formula of the September 2005 U.N. World Summit. There is no peace with out development; there is no development without peace; and there is no lasting peace and sustainable development without respect for human rights. The U.N.'s challenge now is to implement this Declaration. Promoting the rule of international law is therefore an extremely important task for the U.N.

Coordinating this process is very difficult, given the large number of United Nations' Members States and their usual intransigence. U.N. Secretary-General António Guterres is attempting to promote this process of coordination.

The challenge for the U.N., therefore, will be to encourage all 193 U.N. Member States to implement the U.N.'s Agenda 2030 and the U.N.'s Sustainable Developments Goas (SDGs). Agenda 2030 is devoted to enhancing the rule of international law and encourages all 193 U.N. Member States to abide by it. At the present time most U.N. Member States abide by the rule of international law and the U.N. Charter only when it is compatible with their foreign policy objectives. That is why the United Nations is unfortunately of less importance than it ought to be.

The time to implement the U.N.'s Agenda 2030 is now. This will help the international community give the rule of international law the central role it deserves in world affairs. The international community must develop new approaches to implement the rule of international law. The United Nations should help all 193 U.N. Member States to strengthen the rule of international law and ensure that abiding by the rule of international law promotes world peace, international security and human rights—the primary purpose of the United Nations and its Charter. This is not an easy or simple task, but it needs to be accomplished if the human family is to endure and have a bright future.
