

Dear members and friends,

I miss you all. I miss standing at the Faith Development station in the lobby of UUCA each Sunday morning and seeing each and every one of your beautiful smiling faces come through our doors. I miss gathering in the chapel for service. I miss being sung out to classes. I miss seeing families gathered at play quietly in the atrium. I miss checking in to see who is gathered with Miss Beverly in the nursery. I miss my church friends.

Though we are grateful to be able to connect virtually during this time for work and school and church, this brings a whole new set of challenges to everyone. I have heard from some people working from home that they feel more inclined to work every second of each day. There is no more interaction in the break room, no one stopping by the desk to break up the day. In some cases, your coworker may have been replaced by your child who needs help with online learning, or a snack, or or or... Though I sure do miss the snuggles of my own littles at this time, I can't imagine how challenging it must be to adjust to all of these new demands of juggling all that needs to come straight out of the home right now. Instead of arriving back home at the end of a school or work day, all of it is being generated in one place. THAT is a LOT of energy!

Our FD Team and I are concerned with being able to offer families the connection they need with our beloved community. Attendance in Spirit Play on Sunday morning has been low. Perhaps we are offering it at the wrong time. Perhaps it is just that "one more thing" that families don't have the bandwidth for. We tried an evening story hour with Devon Southall and family with the same result. Though we don't want to discontinue programming for the youngest of our community at this time, it seems we do have to reimagine it. Part of the reimaging will be to have Spirit Play within our 10:30 am service more often, so be watching for this!

The FD Team will be reaching out to all of our families with the main question, "What do you need from your church community at this time?" Also, "How can UUCA be respite for parents at this time?" You are welcomed into helping us come up with creative solutions for these difficult days.

Young Adult programming will continue virtually at noon on Sundays. Our Youth will continue to meet virtually on Sundays at 1:00 pm. Creativity will be needed here as well. We will be looking to engage in some spring and summer activities as we may be able to "open back up," though it is difficult to imagine the exact time and breadth of what this will look like.

# **VOICE BUFFALO UPDATE**

The Buffalo Police Dept and the DA are reviewing a policy draft and the Memorandum of understanding to go ahead with LEAD (law enforcement assisted diversion) program. The group needs to find funding.

Juvenile Justice Coalition is reviewing data collected by the Burns Institute and a contracted partner to review data regarding the disproportateness of arrest, detention and probation issues. Next they will review the suspension rates and determine the next steps.

Erie County holding Center held a Radical Love Campaign to collect money for commissary ,& phone calls since the holding center has extremely high rates for those citizens awaiting their, outcomes. In partnership with the WNY Peace Center, Just Resist, SURJ,& VOICE Faith Caucus Leaders held a vigil in December to honor the lives lost in the holding center and also in support of their loved ones. The next step is to work on improving the intake process and ending solitary confinement.

The DMR (Disproportionate Minority Representation Group) is partnering with Family, Court, Dept. of Social Services, Child Protective Services and Child and Family Services to host restorative community dialogues. These restorative practices provide understanding, identify solutions and how to restore the harm that has been done.

VOICE has had Research Action Meetings with School Board Chair, Phil Rumore, who supports Restorative practices and VOICE, is working on a proposal and funding to set up two pilot schools, one grade and one high school.

VIBE is a group of young people, from high school and college, that are working intensely on GET OUT THE VOTE. VOICE has a program, from FAITH IN ACTION, and it has provided lap tops and all the necessary materials since one of the organizers has been trained in the GET OUT THE VOTE process.

This is just a sampling of the many plans and actions VOICE is working on at present. At that annual meeting the organizers listed all the lives, events, and actions that is has influenced. Our UU Amherst would be proud and excited about what this organization has done and intensifies over the years. # **BOARD NOTES**

Dear UUCA members and friends,

We're reaching that time of the year where the necessary business activities of the church must be completed. We have to approve a budget for 2020-21, and elect new trustees and new members of the Nominating Committee. Normally, we do this via a congregational meeting at the church in June. We have no expectation that such a meeting can be held in-person this year, due to the COVID-19 pandemic. But the show must go on, and like everything else these days, we'll hold the meeting virtually, online. We'll send further details as the time approaches.



I have a number of things to report regarding the church's finances. First, we are no longer benefitting from the weekly plate collection, but that shortfall can be addressed — please look for the email from Yvonne Stocker describing how you can make your plate collection using your phone, either via text, or using an app. There's a bit of setup needed beforehand, but once that's done, you can make your donation in an instant. If you're unsure how to do it, just write to me or Yvonne.

Second, we've had a surprising amount of success this year with the canvas; this outcome owes very much to the hard work of the Finance Committee, led by Karen and John Thompson. I say "surprising" because of fears of repercussions due to the shutdown of the economy. However, we expect to be short on funds, due in some part to uncertainty about our usual fundraisers (in addition to the plate collection), which are an important part of the church's total income. A couple of members have made pledges structured to encourage others to increase theirs, or more importantly, have allowed some members to maintain their affiliation with the church. But still, you may expect that we will present a deficit budget when we bring it to the congregation for approval.

Third, there is pleasant news to report: it seems that the church is carrying some non-negligible "float" in our bank account, resulting from prudent frugality of many prior boards. The determination of the amount is complicated by vagaries of the cash flow (e.g., timing of members' pledge payments), and we are working to get a handle on it; we have been stymied in this effort by a series of unfortunate events, culminating in the shutdown. Regardless, these funds will help us stay afloat while working with a budget deficit.

Fourth, we have submitted an application for a Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) grant, which takes the form of a forgivable loan that allows small businesses (like us) to keep paying salaries of its workers through the shutdown. The first Congressional allocation was spent before we got to apply, but there's a new bill coming through Congress that should renew it, and we expect to be among the first in line. For getting this done, we can thank the truly heroic efforts of Don Tucker, who had some help from Cindy Becker, as well as support from Hella Jacob, Karen Thompson, and the church staff (Camilla and Elaine). If this succeeds, it will help us a lot in getting through the coming year.

Finally, I want to make sure everyone appreciates the remarkable fact that we have kept functioning in this extraordinary situation. We're holding services every Sunday, the office is operating, and people are staying connected (and even more is happening in this direction too). A lot of people have contributed to this outcome, but none more so than our Reverend Michelle. She has handled truly difficult situations with grace and skill, and left us all with hope, and appreciation for each other. We've transitioned from live services with nerve-wracking glitches to clever, creative, and beautiful recorded segments that bring in a lot of the church community. This has been accomplished with hard work not only from Rev. Michelle, but also DFD Angela.

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Warren and Intern Minister Kristina Church, as well as Michelle's husband Les and the rest of the tech team – Kim Connolly, Devon Southall, and Scott Harrigan. Les has had a couple of late (4:00 am) nights/mornings pulling together the pieces of the service in time to present them for everyone at 10:30 Sunday morning. This accomplishment has been crucial to the continued vitality of the church

The Board is grateful to Rev. Michelle for the dedication, leadership, patience, and wisdom she brings to the church every day in her service to the congregation. Even in these difficult times (actually, especially in these difficult times), we cannot let this go unacknowledged. Rev. Michelle has been underpaid by the standards of the UUA, and especially by comparison to all of the ministers who preceded her (all with larger salaries). That float we are carrying represents funds that could have been used to pay her closer to a proper level. Anticipating what the Board was thinking, and recognizing the difficult times we're in, Rev. Michelle said that now was not the time to address this. The Board respectfully disagreed. Accordingly, we have voted to provide Rev. Michelle with a bonus for the current year, and we expect to include a raise for her (and the staff) in the 2020-21 budget we bring to the congregation. We hope that you will agree that this is not only a good investment in UU Amherst, but is also the right thing to do.

# NOTES FROM THE COMMITTEE ON MISSION

In the coming months, you will be hearing more and more about our new Committee on Mission (COM). The committee's job is to review the various ministries of the church to see if we are fulfilling our mission "to challenge ourselves and the community to foster more compassion and justice in the world." Initially, we plan to meet with the various ministry teams to gather information and feedback, and eventually expand our scope to other areas of church life.

The process will be collaborative, positive, and transparent, with the goal of helping the church to live up to its full potential and improve its ability to fulfill the mission among ourselves and in the wider community. This process will be an ongoing part of our church culture, with different ministries being reviewed each year. At the Annual Meeting, the COM will summarize and report its findings.

The Committee on Mission consists of three members, appointed by the Board of Trustees for a 3-year term, plus one representative from the Board of Trustees as a liaison. The 3-year terms of the COM will be rotated, with one member being replaced each year. The COM currently consists of Suzanne Christ, Diane Bofinger, and Barbara Gauger Kent. Barbara will be rotating off at the end of May.
