I've been writing about Unitarian Universalist spiritual practices this year. Since it's pledging season, I now consider the practice of financial generosity. "Generosity is based in knowing what you are capable of giving, and going just a little beyond that." -Lodro Rinzler

Generosity is a sort of spiritual weightlifting program; it helps us find the edge where giving takes effort, but doesn't harm our fiscal (or physical!) fitness.

Gratitude

Financial situations vary; some budgets have absolutely no wiggle room, but often we can find ways to contribute to organizations that are important to us. Just as exercise helps us know our own bodies better, we can better understand our financial health when we give intentionally and consistently, resisting comparing ourselves to others.

Building generosity takes focused, mindful effort by tracking spiritual inputs and outputs. Become aware of life's abundance with a gratitude journal, or some other way of recognizing your many blessings. Like in-breaths and out-breaths, gratitude and generosity form a natural cycle, so gratefulness brings a desire to give back. A regular giving regimen will yield the results we're seeking. And as with physical exertion, rest and recuperation are sometimes required. When there are setbacks or new circumstances, expectations may need to change.

Making and keeping a pledge supports our beloved community and also transforms and empowers us: it changes our relationship to money, to stuff, and to the delicate balance between getting and giving. It transforms our relationship to the congregation, too, as we go from being passive consumers to supporters, or even pillars. It can be the difference between saying I go to church and knowing I am the church.

I hope you'll commit to a pledge of consistent support to UUCA. Thanks to all who contribute to our community. Your practice of generosity makes a difference!



MIZERIA (Polish cucumber salad)

It's easy and vegetarian and always popular.



1 cucumber peeled and sliced thinly on a mandoline

1 cup of sour cream

2 tablespoons white vinegar

Salt and pepper

2 tablespoons chopped green onion (optional)

1 teaspoon sugar



To wilt the cucumber, pour boiling water over the sliced cucumber to cover, stir and let stand for 5 minutes. Drain, rinse in cold water and drain again.

Add the vinegar, sugar, green onion, if using, and a dash of salt and pepper to the sour cream and mix until the sugar is melted. Add the mixture to the cooled cucumber and stir well. Refrigerate for at least 1 hour. Serve.

Date will be finalized by mid-March and Sign-up will start in April.



UUCA Governance Re-Structuring – Update

In last month's newsletter, we shared that as part of fulfilling the Strategic Plan, UUCA is moving into a 'policy-based' governance model, in which the primary responsibility of the Board is to provide leadership to the minister, staff, and congregation through a clearly articulated and coherent mission, vision, outcomes, and policies. The policy-based governance model that the Board is using divides all of the committees and teams of the church into either **Governance** or **Ministry**, with most of the programs, activities, and day-to-day responsibilities falling in the category of Ministry and supervised by the minister. A true governing board has only a few committees, including Finance, Personnel, Nominating, and Governance. These committees advise the Board in accomplishing their work.



On January 24th there was a Full Council information session where committee chairs and other church leaders had an opportunity to ask questions and begin thinking about how this structural change can enhance our shared ministries and focus the work of the Board. The main takeaways were:

The language of 'committees' is reserved for those groups that advise the Board.

There are four Ministry 'teams' that are made up of related task groups.

The purpose of Ministry teams is to foster greater communication and collaboration among related task groups.

Ministries Council meetings will be held on a regular basis, made up of representatives from the teams and task groups.

Although the terminology has changed and the accountability made more transparent, the Ministry Teams are not so different from the Council structure that was initiated a decade or so ago. The primary changes have been to the focus and work of the Board and the committees that inform its work. In the coming months the Board will be reviewing and revising the Policy Handbook as well as the Bylaws to make the necessary adaptations to be consistent with policy-based governance.
