MINISTER'S CORNER



Minister's Corner:

"The message of our faith is not simply "Be curious!" It's "Be curious until there are consequences!" (Rev. Scott Taylor, Soul Matters Team Lead)

We UUs pride ourselves on our intellectual curiosity. I'd even go so far to say that, if we had a list of 'deadly sins,' a lack of curiosity would be close to the top of the list. But I wonder, where does our curiosity get us? Hopefully not like the cat of homespun wisdom where curiosity is a fatal flaw.

When I happened on the observation above from Scott Taylor, it challenged me to think about curiosity in the light of white supremacist culture, as well as from my own conviction that we are drawn to novelty, with little tolerance for repetition; it feels like they are woven into a culture of privilege. What good do we do if we are only mildly curious about the experience of the marginalized, and if we are not compelled to act upon what we learn? Is it not a sin to be so caught up in our own lofty thoughts that we fail to notice (or care) about the suffering of others or the impact of humanity's carelessness on the Earth?

Curiosity comes naturally to us. Channeling that curiosity and acting upon what we find is not nearly so intuitive or easy. Maybe that's Reason #625 To Come to Church; to gather in community to help one another notice, to care, and to join our resources in order to make a difference – for our curiosity to have consequences.

Bring a flower (or a few) to share as we celebrate this beloved Unitarian Universalist rite.

The Flower Ceremony, sometimes referred to as Flower Communion or Flower Festival, is an annual ritual that celebrates beauty, human uniqueness, diversity, and community.

Originally created in 1923 by Unitarian minister Norbert Capek of Prague, Czechoslovakia, the Flower Ceremony was introduced to the United States by Rev. Maya Capek, Norbert's widow.

In this ceremony, everyone in the congregation brings a flower. Each person places a flower on the altar or in a shared vase. The congregation and minister bless the flowers, and they're redistributed. Each person brings home a different flower than the one they brought.

Hello again! I recently returned from Chicago, where I took more coursework at my seminary, Meadville Lombard Theological School. One of my classes this year was called "Spiritual Practice". I picked up a handy rubric for thinking about one's own life practices (which could be defined as the activities we regularly and intentionally engage in for self-improvement, balance, and/or happiness).

Basically, the creators of the "integral transformative practices" model, Leonard, Murphy, and Wilber, define four different areas of intentional life practice. Here are the categories, with a partial list of activities included within each (with the realization that some activities could fit in more than one category):

Mind practices: Book groups, reading and study, discussion and debate, writing, pursuing academic or professional degrees, continuing education classes, learning a new language.

Heart practices: Dream work, psychotherapy, art or music therapy, journaling, volunteer work, philanthropy, couples counseling, twelve-step programs, covenant groups, spending time with friends.

Body practices: Running, hiking, strength training, yoga, balanced diet and conscious eating, knitting, crafting, T'ai Chi, martial arts, folk dancing, any kind of sport.

Spiritual practices: Meditation, prayer, yoga, chanting, worship and congregational life, personal and group rituals, spiritual direction, spiritual retreats.

According to the authors, we can take an appraising look at our own lives by noticing what kinds of activities tend to occupy our time. Is there a good distribution among the four categories, or are we devoting the majority of our time to only one or two of them? Has something in our life circumstances tipped the balance, or prevented us from engaging in all kinds of healthy human functioning?

Not surprisingly, I found that as a student, I am spending a good deal of my time engaging in mind practices, while (ironically, for a minister in training) my heart, body, and spiritual practices have fallen off rather steeply. I need to step away from the schoolwork more often in order to connect with friends and family, practice my yoga, take a walk in the woods, or meditate.

While each of us will tend to have a preferred area, all of us will find that we thrive best when we devote some of our time and energy to practices in each of these domains. I hope you'll find this self-assessment tool as useful as I did!



Annual Congregation Meeting

The Annual Meeting of the congregation will be held following worship on **Sunday**, **June 9**. Plan to attend!

Members in good standing (those who have signed the Membership book 60 days before the meeting, have made a financial contribution, and a pledge of sustaining financial support) are eligible to vote. Voting will be on next year's budget as well as proposed changes to the church Bylaws. There will also be votes for new Board Members and Nominating Committee Members.

The nominating committee has submitted to the Board a slate of candidates consisting of the following candidates for the 3-year terms on the Board of Trustees:

The Nominating Committee of the Board of Trustees is proposing the following **Bylaw Changes** to be voted on at the June 9, 2019 Congregational Meeting.

- The name of the Committee will be changed to Nominating and Leadership Development Committee
- Members of the Committee will be elected for staggered two year terms
- Number of Committee members will be 6, including one appointed from Board of Trustees
- Committee shall give a report to the Board in April each year (current bylaws states by first week of April)

Specific language changes are given below.

ARTICLE V. MEETINGS Section A. The corporation shall hold its annual meeting in June in each year at such time and place as may be decided by the Board of Trustees and stated in the notice of the meeting. The annual meeting shall: 1) Elect trustees for three (3) year terms as needed to replace trustees whose terms have expired and fill vacancies with unexpired terms; 2) Elect three (3) members of the nominating committee; 3) Elect one (1) trustee for each new term or vacancy on the Board of Trustees of the Unitarian Universalist Church of Amherst Endowment Trust 4) Transact such other business as may be properly brought before it.	ARTICLE V. MEETINGS Section A. The corporation shall hold its annual meeting in June in each year at such time and place as may be decided by the Board of Trustees and stated in the notice of the meeting. The annual meeting shall: 1) Elect trustees for three (3) year terms as needed to replace trustees whose terms have expired and fill vacancies with unexpired terms; 2) Elect members of the nominating & leadership development committee for two (2) year terms as needed to replace members whose terms are expired and to fill vacancies with unexpired terms; 3) Elect one (1) trustee for each new term or vacancy on the Board of Trustees of the Unitarian Universalist Church of Amherst Endowment Trust 4) Transact such other business as may be properly brought before it.
ARTICLE VII. NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS Section A. There shall be a nominating committee of five (5) members, three (3) of whom shall be elected at the annual meeting. The chairperson of the retiring nominating committee shall be the fourth member. The Board of Trustees shall appoint the additional member at its first regular meeting following the annual meeting. The nominee of the Board of Trustees shall not be eligible to become chairperson of the nominating committee.	ARTICLE VII. NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS Section A. There shall be a nominating & leadership development committee of six (6) members, one of whom shall be appointed annually from the Board of Trustees at its first regular meeting following the annual meeting. The remaining members shall be elected at an annual meeting to staggered two (2) year terms. Asian Greens with Mushroom Oyster Sauce By Wegmans

1/2 cup unsalted roasted cashews

1/2 Tbsp trimmed chopped green onion

1/2 tsp + 1/2 Tbsp toasted sesame oil

4 oz Baby Bella mushrooms, washed

1 Tbsp olive oil

1/2 Tbsp chopped garlic

1/3 cup organic chicken broth

1/4 cup oyster sauce

1 lb. petite baby book choy, washed, drained well and halved



Add mushrooms, green onions and 1/2 tsp sesame oil to small bowl; stir to combine. Set aside

Heat 12 in cast iron skillet on HIGH, add mushrooms. Cook, stirring occasionally, 3 min. Add 1/2 Tbsp olive oil and garlic; cook stirring 15 sec. Add chicken broth and oyster sauce; stir to combine. Cook 4 min. Add remaining sesame oil and stir to combine. Remove from heat.

Add remaining olive oil to stockpot of boiling, salted water. Add baby book choy and blanch 1 1/2 to 3 min until tender. Drain well.

Transfer to serving platter. Top with cashew mixture and drizzle with mushroom mixture.

Serves 6. Time 25 min.

Vegetable stock and vegetable oyster sauce can be used to make this vegetarian/vegan.
