

church that day, and then I listen. What are they looking
for? Community, meaning, direction and connection to a
purpose greater than themselves."

We also have "stealth greeters" on Sunday mornings, and we can always use more. When we actively listen to a newcomer, we are creating a connection. We are exploring: What do our spiritual journeys have in common? How can this traveler step beyond the threshold of the first visit and begin to explore the religious, social, ethical and other aspects of our beloved community?

Health Awareness - Suzanne Christ. RN, Faith Community Nurse, Caring For One Another

February is National Heart Month and this year we decided to repeat last year's event for our church community of taking blood pressures in the dining/living rooms after the Sunday church service. Lisa Mulder and myself from Caring For One Another will be taking the blood pressures. Anyone interested in having theirs checked please join us!

The American Heart Association has published a 2015 "Seasonal Update" entitled Living a Heart-Healthy Life. New studies show that the risk factors that lead to heart disease and stroke, such as high blood pressure, physical inactivity, and obesity, also contribute to dementia, Alzheimer's disease, memory loss, and cognitive dysfunction. The American Heart Association has developed the My Life Check program using Life's Simple 7, a simple seven-step list to help people live a longer, more productive, healthier life:

- ♥ Manage Blood Pressure
- Control cholesterol
- Reduce blood sugar
- Get active
- Eat better
- Lose weight
- Stop smoking





On 9 November 2012, U.N. Secretary-General Mr. Ban Ki-moon reiterated his call for more action to control climate change while addressing the U.N. General Assembly. His address was delivered in response to the destruction caused by Hurricane Sandy. "Storms and emergencies pose great tests and challenges. They bring out the best in people who work beyond the call of duty in trying and even heroic circumstances...But emergency situations can also lay bare where we may have been operating on flawed assumptions and must do better. Such was the case over the last two weeks.... The U.N. continued to provide its vital global services despite major disruptions,...At the same time, where there were mistakes-there must be lessons to be learned. We are determined to work with all of you to learn and move forward." The U.N. General Assembly also devoted a minute of silence to all the storm's victims.

Not only the U.S. eastern coastline and the New York metropolitan area were effected by this "once in a generation storm", but also damaged were many Caribbean U.N. member states including Haiti, Cuba, Jamaica, the Dominican Republic and the Bahamas. In the wake of the hurricane, the Secretary-General pledged the full support of the U.N and expressed his solidarity with all the storm's victims. Hurricane Sandy's arrival and its effects on New York City caused the U.N. to be closed for an unprecedented three days, before re-opening on Thursday, 1 November 2012. As a result of this storm, U.N. headquarters sustained minor damage. "Let me also stress that our global services were provided without interruption. Many of the

staff worked around the clock," Mr. Ban said, "but more information about the storm should have been conveyed to the public."

In their remarks to the special session of the U.N. General Assembly, both the Secretary-General and the U.N. General Assembly President, Mr. Vuk Jeremic, raised the issue of climate change. "Extreme weather events caused by global warming are but one manifestation of the reality of climate change. This is a very serious issue that requires us to work much more closely together in order for it to be adequately addressed," Mr. Jeremic said.

U.N. Secretary-General Ban-Ki-Moon acknowledged the difficulties in attributing any single storm to climate change. "But we also know this: extreme weather events due to climate chare are the new normal." The world's best climate scientists have been sounding the alarm for many years. The U.N. Secretary-General said the challenge before the international community remains clear and urgent: a reduction in greenhouse gas emissions, and the need to reach a legally binding climate change agreement by 2015. "This should be one of the main lessons of Hurricane Sandy. The U.N. and human family need to control climate change before it is too late," emphasized Mr. Ban. Such an agreement though far from being perfect was recently adopted in Paris. 29 October 2015 was the third anniversary of Hurricane Sandy and its horrible destruction. Let us take unequivocal steps to ensure that such horrific weather events never occur again; otherwise, the human family will be gradually rendered extinct. The time for decisive action is now.
