Nine Ways to Make a Terrible First Impression

A recent episode on the Thom S. Rainer blog on "Growing Healthy Churches, Together" was titled *Nine Ways to Make a Terrible First Impression*. (Podcast #236). It provides some useful observations and suggestions to improve our encounters with newcomers:

Church members are often friendly...to the people they already know.

Don't wait for a guest to ask a question. If you see they need help, help them.

People want to know you are interested in them when they visit your church.

Relationships are the #1 thing that brings people to a church, keeps them, and gets them involved. When you meet a new guest at church, it is a time to listen to them, not debate with them.

Not everyone is a hugger.

The nine ways church members can make a terrible first impression are:

Wait for visitor to approach you.

Make your handshake at weak as possible (or as strong as possible).

Avoid eye contact. (Instead, look at their eyes.)

Don't use the other person's name.

Talk about your successes a lot.

Act bored when they talk.

Whenever possible, vehemently disagree with them.

Don't crack a smile.

Don't say goodbye."

The effort to discover our UUCA Vision and Mission is continuing, the 'scribes' are trying to get together to smooth out the product of the September 17 workshop. We have left posted, in the Emerson Room, your words from the survey that tell us what UUCA is all about. We will have another Congregational Meeting and Vote. Every month of the year is designated a cancer awareness month. October was breast cancer awareness month, November is lung cancer awareness month, and so on. The statistics are not pretty, but then again none of us is immortal. It wasn't long ago that it was thought that DNA was the blueprint of life. Now it's known, that if it even is the blueprint of life, it is a very fluid one. Genes & bits of genes have been discovered that increase one's susceptibility to cancer. But that by no means indicates 100% vulnerability. Our lifestyles, exposure to certain elements, or lack of them, our psyche, etc. all influence our susceptibility to cancer and all disease. Excellent information can be found on the National Cancer Institute's (NCI) website: www.cancer.gov (not to be confused with www.cancer.com which is a completely different site) The NCI website is updated as new material comes in. It has information written in both lavman and health professional language. The health professional version has a great deal more significant information. Another website to check out is Environmental Working Group at http:// www.ewg.org. There are a plethora of websites and books available for adding more veggies to your diet.

Cancer prevention:

Get regular exercise - 30 min/day
Eat a healthy diet (whole,
unprocessed foods, without
preservatives, colors, flavor enhancers etc.)
increase your vegetable intake
decrease your meat intake

Reduce your exposure to known carcinogens
Filter your tap water (No bottled water), use
glass or stainless steel containers
avoid dry cleaning

Avoid smoking & other tobacco products, including second hand smoke

Avoid excessive alcohol

Give your immune system an additional boost:

Laugh out loud
Do what you love
Connect with people/animals
Take a hike outdoors

Cancer Screening:

Screening is checking for cancer in people who have <u>no symptoms</u>. It's early detection. This is not prevention. Early detection may (not always) make that cancer easier & more effectively to treat. Screening does come with risks as well as benefits.

Endowment Trust

The Endowment Trust is an important funding source for the church. It is a resource to help with major facility projects that go beyond the scope of our operational budget, such as the chapel roof and parking lot repaying. This money came from accumulated interest from investments managed by Angelucci Wealth Management. It manages special accounts such as the Music Fund (that is partially paying the Music Director's salary).

It is important to keep the Endowment Trust growing so we can continue to be a financial resource for the church, when needed. We should all *consider adding the church in our wills*. But in the meantime, *smaller, periodic gifts* can be a great benefit to the ET and the church, as well as being the perfect *gift in memory of friends or loved ones who have died*. Even if you are not thinking about a formal commitment, you can support the Endowment if you use Amazon.com. Sign up for *smile.amazon.com*, designate Unitarian Universalist Church of Amherst Endowment Trust and a percentage of all of your purchases will go to the Trust.

If you want to learn more about the Endowment, you can talk to the trustees: Dennis Bihl, Nan Cosbey, Doug Funke, Jerry Kent and Lauraine Marcus. An Endowment Trust brochure can be found on the pamphlet carousel in the lobby. It provides useful information about legacy giving, as well as about specific details about our Trust.

The Endowment Trust continues to meet quarterly, usually the 3rd Tuesday at the church. At the meeting, Mr. Angelucci of Angelucci Wealth Management reviews the status of our investments and explains the nuances of risk analysis and prudent investment strategies to assist the trustees in making informed and careful financial decisions on behalf of the Trust.



END OF LIFE SERIES



The series is off to a great start with Reverend Michelle's delivery of a compassionate & moving sermon on the end of life on Sunday, September 18th. Lynn Riker, Director of Clinical Outreach Hospice Buffalo, provided an informative introduction to the realities of growing old and how to prepare. She covered a variety of forms, legal considerations, services available through Hospice including their home connections as well as bereavement services.

Sunday, October 30th at 12:00 p.m. Preparing for a Funeral & Memorial Service

Thaddeus Bieniek, President Greater Buffalo Memorial Society, will present on the various options that are available for funerals, what to look for and what to avoid.

About the Greater Buffalo Memorial Society: it is a 501 (c)(3) education and advocacy organization run by an all volunteer board. They are not affiliated with the funeral industry or any religious groups. They educate the public on their rights and options when planning for or purchasing funeral goods and services. They encourage people to plan arrangements that are in keeping with their personal wishes and budget, and then share that information with their survivors.

Thaddeus will have some brochures and booklets on hand. He is also a fellow UU member of the Buffalo congregation where he is head usher.

Sunday, November 5th at 12:00 p.m. Let's Fill out the forms

We will have a variety of forms on hand that we will fill out together. This is for practice only. It will give you a better understanding of what is involved in each of the forms, what exactly each form does or does not do. Some forms we will have on hand include: Living Will, Healthcare Proxy, DNR/Molst, and file of life.

Exit - is about a father who does not want to live. His children discuss whether or not do this —over a period of 3 years. There is no resolution; encourages discussion.

My way- A husband is ill and needs a feeding tube. His wife needs to decide what to do. This skit deals with legal issues.

Sunday, January 8th at 12:00 p.m. Nursing Homes and Assisted Living with Kimberly Kent and Darlene Harris.

Brainstormers will perform one skit: *Welcome home*, which is about 2 sisters deciding to put Dad in a nursing home/assisted living. Dad doesn't want to go.

Kimberly Kent is a social worker with extensive experience in geriatrics within hospitals, long term care and assisted living facilities. She is passionate about helping people maneuver through the increasingly, complex healthcare system. She will address a multitude of criteria, what your rights are, what questions to ask and so forth. Darlene Harris is an ombudsman, also with extensive experience and will add to these issues. Both women are UUCA Caring for Each Other Committee members.

Sunday, February 5th at 12:00 p.m. What matters to me, skit by Brainstormers with discussion to follow. One of the topics that has been suggested for this session is physician assisted suicide. This is a controversial but very important topic. Stay tuned. This will be the last of our series.



U.U.-U.N. NEWS

World War II was the worst war in human history. As a result of that horrendous international conflagration, approximately sixty million human beings perished. In Prime Minster Winston

Spencer Churchill's book, <u>The Gathering Storm</u>, President Franklin Delano Roosevelt asked the Prime Minister what he could call World War II. Prime Minister Churchill immediately responded by calling World War II, "The Unnecessary War." War is the most horrible thing human beings can do to each other. The United Nations was created as a result of World War II. To this day, the U.N. has not achieved its primary purpose: to eliminate the scourge of war through an effective system of collective security. War needs to be outlawed as an instrument of foreign policy. If there is another World War, World War III, the human family will probably be rendered extinct.

At the present time, there are numerous war and civil conflicts occurring throughout our interdependent world. While women remain a minority of combatants in any way, they increasingly suffer the greatest harm. In contemporary conflicts, as much as ninety percent of the casualties are among civilians, most of whom are women and children. Women in war torn U.N. Member States generally face devastating forms of sexual violence. These human rights violations must cease. Women are human beings and should be

treated accordingly. Moreover, women continue to be poorly represented in informal peace processes, although they contribute in many informal ways to conflict resolution. In recent peace negotiations, women have constituted fewer than eight percent of the participants, and fewer than three percent of the signatories, and no women have ever been appointed chief mediator in U.N. sponsored peace talks. Such exclusion invariably leads to a failure to adequately address women's concerns and humanity's future.

Recognizing the impact of war on women and the importance of their involvement in the peace process, in October 2000, the U.N.'s Security Council unanimously adopted a groundbreaking resolution on Women, Peace and Security. Resolution 1325 urges all U.N. Member States to increase women's representation at all decision -making levels for the prevention, management, and resolution of war. U.N. Security Council Resolution 1325 urges the United Nations' Secretary-General to appoint more women as his envoys, and expand women's role in United Nations peacemaking. The United Nations' Security Council also calls on all mediators to adopt a gender perspective and to protect women and children from gender-based violence. This is an abominable state of affairs and can be eliminated by recognizing women's humanity and by outlawing war and all forms of violence again women. The time to act is now. There is no time to lose.
