And remember, we do not discriminate based on age, gender, if you do or do not have children, how long you have been involved with the congregation, etc. Pick one, or design your own:

Adopt a Bulletin Board to decorate and update

Organizers needed. We have lots of classroom supplies, but they are not always in the right place and labeled. OCD an asset.

Toddler toys have found their way into classroom spaces. Needed is someone to find and sort through what we have, decide with me what to keep and what we no longer need. Bonus – you might get to take home a treasure!

Do dust bunnies and cob webs drive you crazy? Tackling a room or space a month – with or without circle of cleaning friends – would be a big gift to the Faith Development ministry.

Shoppers needed – Rummage Sale, second hand as well as retail. I supply the wish lists and you look for bargains. Let me know your "specialty".

In the meantime, there is *conversation* about offering the 10th-12th Grade level of OWL beginning in January. Youth and parents, give it some thought. What Does an Interim Director of Faith Development Do - Part 1?

First and foremost, as your Interim Director of Faith Development, I am charged with supporting your programming for children and youth. But in addition, there are specific areas that we are charged with examining and working WITH YOU so that at the end of my 2 year contract you will be in a position to recruit and retain a qualified new director. Consider the first area:

Coming to Terms with History

Helping the congregation's leaders to get a perspective on its RE history and culture. Helping the congregation claim, honor and appreciate its past and work toward health and healing.

Gathering information and viewpoints about past events and circumstances.

Helping congregation and RE leaders to process the transition of the predecessor. During the Sept. 23 Start-Up Workshop time is set aside to tell the stories about past people and events that have shaped the present culture. The founding stories shape how we feel about ourselves, as do the events of last year that led to the departure of Victoria Crago as DRE. Processing takes time but can inform our future direction. Ignoring will doom us to relive the past, so one of my roles as your interim will be to ask questions and listen with an open heart. It is good that we are together to do this important interim work!

BOARD NOTES:

Hi again, from your Board of Trustees.

As we begin our new church year the Board is work-

ing to help all of us focus on what we need to do. We have no preconceived notions of how we might do this and to this end a special workshop on discovering our UUCA Vision and Mission was conducted on Saturday September 17. In all 20 people participated and were led by Nikki Hitchcock to think, consider, reflect and try to discover what and where UUCA is headed. Before the workshop many people participated in a survey where we were trying to gather words that tell us what UUCA is all about. We listened and used those words to describe our Vision and then to describe the Mission - which is how we get to our Vision! Thank you to Nikki; we are so fortunate to have a professional of such high caliber in our congregation. Thank you to all who provided input to our survey. Now our scribes will polish the words we crafted and present our work at gatherings after church service so that all of you - those who participated, those who submitted surveys and those who have yet to speak—can see and hear what we (all of us) propose. After these consultations and discussions, we will have another Congregational Meeting and Vote. So please be a knowledgeable elector and prepare yourself fully.

We are making improvements – most of which you can't see – which make life better for our employees and all our members, friends and guests. *The unified fire alarm system is now complete and functioning*. It is not mandated that the church conduct fire drills but it would be prudent to do so at least once and perhaps annually. The Board is considering how and when we will conduct such a test. We will tell you when it is coming! (Soon before the snow!!)

Another invisible advance is on our use of technology. As a reminder, *our web* <u>site is not just for visitors</u> – it is for us. We have an updated *leadership page* which shows the members of the Board the Endowment Trust and also Staff – all the pictures and a short bio of each – so you can meet all the people who do stuff here! We also have *The Calendar* – it is live and up to the minute – use it when you want to know when and where activities are happening. We also have *Forms* – to ask for things you need – please use these – that way you can ask a question or make a request whenever you think of it – even at 2:30am – you likely won't get an answer before 9:00am but at least you have asked the question!

Once again – I extend to all members and friends – and those not yet officially in our community the invitation to *speak to board members about any issue, concern or idea*. Remember please, that any member is invited to attend and listen at any board meeting. If you wish to present an idea or raise an issue with the Board, please consult the Board Chair a least the day before the meeting. **Board meetings are held regularly each month on the second Wednesday starting at 7:00pm in the Emerson Room.**

GREEN TIPS:

Liquid Laundry Detergent

It's easy to make your own laundry detergent. It even works better than the store bought version. Be sure to grate the soap, other wise the melting part will take a

very, very, very long time. The solution will separate between uses, give it a shake before adding to your load.

Supplies:

1 gallon hot water

1/2 bar castile soap (available Wegmans)

2 cups baking soda (purchase 4 lbs in laundry area)

Directions:

- Grate the bar of soap & gently melt in a saucepan with enough hot water to cover. Cook on medium-low heat, stirring frequently until soap is melted.
- Pour 1 gallon of hot water into a large pail. Add the melted soap & stir well.

Add baking soda, stir well.

Use 1/2 cup per full load. Up to 1 cup per very soiled load.





Caring For One Another Chair

Thank you all for the warm welcome and support both Ron & I received as Lisa & Scott Mulder transferred the chair & co-chair position to us. We ask for your understanding and patience as we make this transition. Ron and I will aspire to be true to our committee name within our UUCA community.

Briefly:

Eveline is a RN BSN and worked first at Roswell Park Cancer Institute and then Hospice Buffalo, retiring in 2008. She completed the Faith Community Nurse course in 2011 and served as Parish Nurse for Epiphany UCC from 2011-2013.

Ron was a Vocational Rehabilitation Counselor for more than 35 years, and has been retired for twelve years. His job was helping individuals with disabilities to enter or re-enter the job market. He has a long history of working with individuals in need.

COLD & FLU SEASON is coming. Be prepared!

Bolster your immune system!

Get enough sleep

Decrease your stress level: Meditate, Breathing exercises, Learn to say "No" Get enough sleep.

Avoid all added sugars, artificial sweeteners and juices.

Keep your vitamin D levels optimal

Exercise daily

Colds are mostly transmitted through direct contact.

Cold viruses survive on most surfaces, be careful what you touch.

Wash your hands thoroughly with plain soap & water.

AVOID antibacterial soaps & cleansers: these are too harsh for skin Take care of your skin – this is your #1 defense!

Avoid touching your face.

If you are coughing - best to stay home.

Remedies:

Hydrogen Peroxide: a few drops in one ear at a time, drain after bubbling stops Gargle & rinse with a baking soda or salt solution 4 X daily (1/4 tsp per cup of water) Use a neti pot to nip sinus infection in the bud (follow neti pot directions) Drink lots of water & fluids to loosen secretions & flush out toxins

Foods to strengthen your immune response:

Fermented foods (tempeh, raw sauerkraut, raw pickles, etc.) Omega 3 foods (ground flax seed, krill, fatty fish, cod liver oil, etc.)

Mushrooms – esp shiitake, Reishi

Garlic – raw, crushed

Turmeric, oregano, cinnamon &/or cloves

Eat your greens – esp raw dark leafy greens

Supplements:

Vitamin C (from natural sources)

Teas made from peppermint and ginger. Drink hot and often. When to call the doctor:

Fever over 102 degrees Fahrenheit (38.9 degrees Celsius) Ear pain

Pain around your eyes, especially with a green nasal discharge Shortness of breath or a persistent uncontrollable cough Persistently coughing up green and yellow sputum

U.U.-U.N. NEWS

<u>2016 U.N. Day Message</u>

October 24th is United Nations Day; that is because the U.N. Charter was adopted on that day in 1945. 2016 is the seventy-first anniversary of the U.N. United States President Franklin Delano Roosevelt is considered to be "the father of the U.N." Every year, U.N. Day is celebrated at U.N. Headquarters in New York City and throughout the world. The United States of America should also participate in the celebration by dismantling its global empire and global military machine and by thoroughly making the U.N. the focal point of its foreign policies.

What are the purposes of the United Nations? The main purposes are:

- to save succeeding generations from the scourge of war,
- to reaffirm faith in fundamental human rights,
- to recognize the dignity and worth of the human person,
- to acknowledge the equal rights of men and women and nations large and small,
- to encourage respect for international law,
- to promote social progress and better standards of life in larger freedom,
- and to maintain international peace and security. The United Nations is a noble experiment.

Despite all the criticism of the organization, the U.N. has been a relative success. It has prevented another world war, promoted social progress and is in the process of realizing its purposes, principles and reforming itself.

Why is the actual United nations so different from the U.N. Charter itself? This is a difficult question to answer. Almost all 193 U.N. Member States do not want to subordinate their sovereignty to the U.N. Consequently, the five permanent members of the U.N. Security Council do not want to elect a first-rate U.N. Secretary –General committed to realizing and strengthening the ideals of the U.N. Charter. Also, the U.N. is a complex bureaucracy and its international civil service and peacekeepers have many inadequacies. There are also many other problems and dilemmas hampering the United Nations.

All this must change. To realize the U.N. Charter, the United Nations must possess the power to eliminate the scourge of war and promote human rights. To accomplish this, the U.N. must create its own effective system of collective security and a better means for promoting human rights. At the present time, universal disarmament and world peace are unfulfilled dreams. Nevertheless, on United Nations Day (24 October), all 193 U.N. Members States and all people should resolve to translate the ideals of the U.N. Charter into reality in our own troubled, interdependent world. The future of humanity depends on an effective United Nations and its ability to maintain international peace and security. There is no time to lose. The time to make this happen is now: otherwise, the future of humanity is bleak, indeed.
